Tuskegee University News

Tuskegee& NIH researchers develop potential way to reprogram immune cells to fight cancer, other diseases



A team of Tuskegee University faculty scientists and doctoral students in conjunction with the National Institutes of Health has conducted immune therapy research that shows a strong potential promise in the future ability to reprogram immune cells, kill cancer cells and halt tumor growth in several types of cancer. This research is documented in detail in the article, "Mannose receptor (CD206) activation in tumor-associated macrophages enhances adaptive and innate antitumor immune responses," which is featured in the February 12, 2020 edition of the Science Translational Medicine weekly journal publication.

The article details how the newly developed therapeutic approach in fighting cancer relies on small proteins called host defense peptides. These are parts of the human immune system's defenses used by organisms to fend off bacteria, viruses, and other foreign invaders of the body. Using an algorithm that detects structural similarities, researchers have discovered that small stretches of amino acids in some of these peptides remained unchanged, or minimally changed, across organisms over millions of years of evolution.

The Tuskegee team is led by Clayton Yates, Ph.D., director of the Center for Cancer Research, and Jesse M. Jaynes, Ph.D. of the College of Agriculture, Environment and Nutrition Sciences. The team also consists of researchers from the NIH's National Cancer Institute (NCI) and National Center for Advancing Translational Sciences (NCATS).

A Guide to HBCUs

U.S. News and World Report recently published an article on historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs), their importance to higher education, and how they typically offer lower tuition costs and serve many under-resourced students.

Since their inception, HBCUs have served a student population that other institutions overwhelmingly refused. "It really was a response to the time of the mid-1800s, to the latter 1800s, where African Americans took their educational aspirations in their own hands, which developed the historically black colleges and universities," explains Joseph Montgomery, vice president for enrollment management and student success at Tuskegee University.

Michael Lomax of the United Negro College Fund wrote in 2015 that HBCUs are more important than ever. Lomax explained this viewpoint with six points: the lower average tuition cost of HBCUs; their success in meeting the needs of low-income and first-generation students; the potential to lower wealth disparity along racial lines; a supportive campus climate; the HBCU track record for postgraduate employment; and how the values of these institutions align with those of their students.

By the numbers, UNCF research suggests that HBCUs have an outsized effect on the education of black students. Despite these successes, challenges remain for HBCUs. Challenges include declining enrollment, maintenance and needed infrastructure improvements, and lower endowments compared to primarily white institutions. But proponents of HBCUs see signs of optimism. Signs include recent increases in federal

funding, rich cultures on HBCU campuses, and increased opportunities for internships and job placement after graduation for students.

Students interested in attending a HBCU should look at their academic programs, visit campuses, and meet with the faculty at prospective schools. They should also consider what support systems are in place, the faculty-to-student ratio and extracurricular activities.

Enrollment Declines Threaten Future of HBCUs, Disheartening Alumni

The National Center for Educational Statistics (NCES) conducted a study on the topic of Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs). The study stated that more than 6,000 fewer students attended the 101 black colleges and universities in the U.S. during the 2018-19 school year. The 291,767 total was down from the 298,134 in the previous year, and was the lowest total since 2001, when there were 289,985 students at historically black colleges.

The NCES study does not explain the drop in HBCU enrollment, but there are indications as to the reasons behind the drop in enrollment. HBCUs lost \$50 million when the Department of Education made it more difficult to acquire the PLUS Loan that many schools relied on. HBCU retention rates are lower than predominantly white institutions. The rising popularity of online for profit colleges and universities has affected the enrollment of HBCUs. The lack of modern technology and building maintenance at HBCUs has caused many potential HBCU students to not attend HBCUs.

To fix these issues many thought leaders have some suggestions. The main suggestion is for presidents of HBCUs to have more of a business person mentality in which they understand that their college or university is a business and work hard to align themselves with major business organizations.

Inquire, Response, Faith, and Follow Through

"How a Potential TU student and family INQUIRY, Washington Tuskegee Alumni Club (WTAC) RESPONSE, FAITH, and FOLLOW THROUGH = an OPPORTUNITY to see a DREAM become a REALITY"

Inquiry:

The WTAC received an email about a local high school senior, who wanted to major in cyber security and aerospace, by attending Tuskegee University. The student applied to Tuskegee in the fall 2019 but had not heard any reply and was wondering what they could do.

Response:

The club jumped on the inquiry and current president, Marcus Cooper, took the lead. Mr. Cooper, not only responded to the email as an acknowledgement that it was received, but acted by reaching out to Mr. Melvin Ross—the WTAC's Chairperson of college recruitment—to see what they could do. Mr. Ross indicated that this week, Tuskegee University admissions recruiter would be present at the Alfred Street Baptist Church college fair on January 25, 2020 and encouraged them to attend. Mr. Cooper discovered that the student and his mom were attending but may not be able to get an onsite interview since all Tuskegee University slots were filled. Mr. Cooper in turn informed the family that the WTAC would have a recruitment team there that may be able to help and the team will be on the lookout for the student.

By the time the student arrived, every member of the WTAC college fair recruitment team was on the alert and eager to see what they could do. Finally, the student appeared with his mom and confirmed that all the interview slots were filled. For many, people tend to lose faith and get discouraged because of what is currently in front of them. Fortunately, we went to Tuskegee University, which taught us that obstacles are just an opportunity to show that our faith in God is stronger than the obstacle presented.

Faith:

One of the Alumnus from the recruitment team advised them to try again around a certain time and see if the recruiter can squeeze them in. Now it was the student's turn to practice some of the lessons they will learn at Tuskegee University, which is being persistent, having faith, never giving up, embracing challenges, and if there is a will, there is a way. The family agreed and waited as recommended. Fifteen (15) minutes after the college fair closed, the TU college recruiter, Marissa Anderson, due to so many students interviewed, finally was able to meet the WTAC recruitment team to gather data and debrief.

Follow Through:

The team inquired if she had met with the local high school student. Marissa could not confirm yea or nay, but both an alumnus of the WTAC recruiting team and her, agreed to go double check upstairs.

While they were walking back upstairs, behold, the student and his mom were waiting as instructed. The alumnus introduced the local high school student to Marissa and she interviewed them instantly.

Guess What?

He got in! He was accepted right on the spot. The student and mom could not believe it, revealed by the shocking expression, mixed with excitement and a Flavor Flav "WOW" on their faces! Marissa and the fellow alumnus were overjoyed from their reaction! They later found out from the mom that this experience was nerve wrecking and really challenging the student to be persistent in order to get an answer from the school that was their first choice. The student could not stop saying, "thank you!" They even wrote the club expressing their joy and gratitude as well.

Amazing how the WTAC's RESPONSE, FAITH, and FOLLOW THROUGH from an email led to a family's dream becoming a reality.

Prior to the event, like every college fair attended by the WTAC, Mr. Melvin Ross, WTAC Chairperson of Tuskegee University Recruitment, made sure each alumni volunteer recruiter, regardless of experience or degree, was properly registered, well

prepared, and understand that the main objective is to give factual information to attendees for them to make an informed decision on attending Tuskegee University. The ASBC WTAC recruitment team was ready for anything.

While the college fair's operating hours were from 9am to 3pm, Tuskegee University's recruiters were in high demand and stayed after closing time. We all agreed that we would give each attendee the opportunity, just like so many of us were given, to not only apply and/or inquire of Tuskegee University, but to experience that TU Love. Many students and parents not only felt that love but some, including random TU alumni stopped by, gave positive feedback about their relatives or someone they know who made a great choice to attend Tuskegee University. This really spoke volumes of the love many of us only can testify by attending Tuskegee University.

The TU admission recruiter Marissa Anderson enjoyed her experience at this event. From seeing so many students with good GPAs and SAT Scores to appreciation of having

the local TU alumni here to help assist. This assistance and support allowed Marissa to give every student, regardless of the max reserved onsite interviews appointments that day, an opportunity to get an onsite interview. Commitment and effort exceeded our expectation as over 100 students applied to Tuskegee and over 80 students were accepted. That's over 80% of students who applied to TU, left the college fair smiling cheek to cheek with a sticker saying, "We got in Tuskegee University". Some students were so excited that after their interview, they came down to the general table to let the WTAC recruiting team know that they got in. Their joy, excitement of getting accepted, and realizing their dreams of attending Tuskegee University becoming a reality was so contagious that the WTAC recruiting team gave high fives, took pictures with them, encouraged them to finish strong, continue to apply for scholarships, and that the WTAC is here for any support.

As we were able to debrief over a meal, we each left with a feeling of honor and eagerness to represent Tuskegee University again which is the normal feeling at all college fairs the WTAC attends. Although this was a great recruiting day, Marissa brought to our mind that for many, this was only the first step. The second step is financing a college education. As many of us are aware, of all of the applicants in this area who were accepted to Tuskegee last year, about 12% became financial TU freshmen. This is a challenge yet an opportunity for others such as us, alumni, to find ways to give back time, money, and/or other resources. The WTAC has offered annually Washington DC area students scholarships and other resources. WE AIM TO DO EVEN MORE but it requires commitment and help from All ALUMNI as well. The demand is

there, the challenge is there, The Washington Tuskegee Alumni club is there, the opportunity to make a difference is there, all we need is you to be there as well and we, together can do it.
