Tuskegee University News

Tuskegee University's Roadmap to the Return to Campus for the Upcoming Academic Year

Tuskegee University has released the initial details concerning its roadmap for a return to campus for the upcoming Fall 2020 term. This plan was developed by the COVID-19 Recovery Management Center (CRMC) which was commissioned by President Lily D. McNair. CRMC has consulted with on-campus and external subject-matter leaders in academics, university operations and public health in order to develop an effective and safe roadmap for the return to campus.

The current roadmap relies on public health conditions and forecasts available to the University today and is subject to change based on evolving conditions surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic. The roadmap includes the following:

Reopening the campus this fall to students and employees on a phased basis, with the intention of returning to full campus operations this spring — as public health conditions allow.

Compressing the fall semester — classes will begin Aug. 11 and end on Nov. 17. Final exams will be completed by Nov. 21, thereby eliminating the need for students to return to campus following the Thanksgiving holiday. The compressed semester schedule will also include the elimination of fall break.

Employing the full measure of CDC-recommended health and safety measures, including increased on-campus physical distancing, mandatory use of masks and other personal protective equipment in campus spaces, and virus testing.

Reducing campus density by limiting campus access to visitors who wear masks, do not report COVID-19 symptoms, and visit in small groups of 10 or less. All visitors will be required to sign in at the university's main gate.

Welcoming first- and second-year students, along with selected others, to reside and study on campus; most upperclassmen will not reside on campus.

Tuskegee University donates over 500 PPE for health care workers, first responders

Tuskegee University recently donated more than 500 pieces of personal protective equipment (PPE) for use by Prime Care Medical Center, in order to help fill in the gap of the shortage of PPE that the center was facing.

"This all started as part of the university's Community Health Task Force, commissioned in the earliest days of the coronavirus to monitor and react to the virus' spread. We saw a need to partner with our community during this pandemic and noted that donating PPE would have a dramatic impact on preventing the virus' spread," said Dr. Deloris Alexander, an associate professor and director of Tuskegee's Integrative Biosciences Ph.D. Program.

Alexander says that the university continues to maintain a small PPE stockpile in order to respond more rapidly to future needs should the pandemic continue.

Tuskegee Held 'Virtual Graduation Observance' on May 9

As a result of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, Tuskegee University turned to a virtual alternative to its Spring Commencement Ceremony to honor the achievements of its Class of 2020 graduates. Instead of an on-campus commencement ceremony, the university organized a video-based "virtual graduation observance," and President Lily D. McNair emphasized the distinction between this observance and a "commencement ceremony" is intentional.

"We have committed to honoring our Class of 2020 graduates in person, on campus and at a time when it's safe and responsible to do so," McNair said. "So, this May's event is not a replacement, but a placeholder, for the true commencement celebration to come."

To honor its graduates in the short-term, the university produced a pre-recorded video observance that included some of the elements of a traditional commencement ceremony. Graduates received well-wishes from the university president, chair of its Board of Trustees, and Tuskegee National Alumni Association president. Their deans presented their respective graduates to the president for

the conferral of their degrees. And graduates heard their names called while student-submitted photos appeared on the virtual stage to mark the receipt of their degrees.

The recorded video ceremony was published to the university's YouTube channel (www.youtube.com/tuskegeeuniversity) on Saturday, May 9. This was the original date of the Class of 2020's commencement ceremony. The ceremony is available on the university's YouTube Channel view at any time.

By the end of May, graduates should have received their diplomas and diploma covers, official transcripts and other materials in the mail.

McNair indicated that university leaders are already considering a date in December when Class of 2020 graduates will be invited to return to campus for an official commencement ceremony. Spring graduates will be notified as early as possible when that date is set so they can make plans to participate.

The university developed its plan for a virtual graduation observance after surveying students, and conferring with its academic leaders and community health experts. The College of Veterinary Medicine hosted a similar event on Friday, May 1, which also included a live administration of the Veterinary's Oath by the college's 56 DVM graduates.

Tuskegee joins Dynetics-led team developing NASA's Artemis Human Lunar Landing System

A multidisciplinary faculty research team from Tuskegee University's College of Engineering is partnering with Huntsville, Alabama-based Dynetics, a wholly owned subsidiary of Leidos, to design a Human Landing System (HLS) to take the first woman and next man to the lunar surface by 2024. Dynetics is one of three primary contractors selected for the contract awarded under NASA's Artemis program.

As the project's only university-based research team, Tuskegee engineering faculty researchers will test and evaluate additively manufactured (AM) materials and parts — namely, those produced through 3D printing processes. This includes tensile and fatigue testing studies to assess their quality and durability in meeting the environmental demands on the HLS Integrated Lander. Metallurgical evaluation will also help establish the microstructure-processing-property relationship of these 3D-printed materials and parts that have different challenges in standardization, qualification and certification compared to standardly manufactured ones.

The Dynetics HLS can be fully integrated and launched on the Space Launch System (SLS) Block 1B vehicle. For commercial launches, it can be flown aboard United Launch Alliance's Vulcan Centaur rocket.

With Dynetics as the prime contractor and system integrator, the team is composed of a broad and diverse set of small and mid-size businesses, as well as NASA field centers with industry-recognized technical expertise and programmatic experience. Major components and subsystems will be built, tested and integrated at a Dynetics facility in northern Alabama.

Suspension of Tuskegee University Fall Sports

Dear Tuskegee Community:

After carefully considering the health risks of the COVID-19 pandemic to our community, the recommendations of public health experts, and the July 9 vote by Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association member institutions to suspend fall competitions, Tuskegee has decided to suspend all of our fall 2020 sports, including football, cross country, and volleyball.

This was not an easy decision for us to make. We are acutely aware of the negative impact this decision will have on student athletes, families, coaches, alumni, and the many fans and supporters of our athletic programs. However, as Tuskegee carries on our mission during these unprecedented times, we are committed to doing everything we possibly can to help protect the health of our students, faculty, and staff. Because athletes are particularly vulnerable to being exposed to COVID-19 given their close contact with other players, we did not want to take any unnecessary risks with their health and well-being.

Although our student athletes will not be competing this semester, we will continue to support them. We will honor all athletic scholarships and obligations; work with the SIAC and NCAA to extend eligibility; and work with our athletic staff to devise a strength and conditioning regimen to help our athletes stay fit and be prepared for future play and competition. While these measures cannot replace the anticipation and excitement of an upcoming season of competition, we hope they reflect to our athletes how much we value them and their contributions.

Like you, I will miss Golden Tiger sports, Homecoming, and the almighty "Ball and Parlay." But for the University to continue to thrive, we all must cooperate in a culture of shared responsibility to help safeguard and benefit the greater Tuskegee community. My hope is that there will soon be a vaccine

to help prevent this lethal virus and that we will be able to safely resume our athletic programs next year.

Thank you for all you do to support Mother Tuskegee.

The uncertainty is how many students will feel confident in returning in person. A significant drop in enrollment for a semester or two may not be a huge blow to larger institutions, but for HBCUs – even those as accomplished as Tuskegee University – it can be damaging.

UPDATE: 19th Biennial TNAA Convention

The Tuskegee National Alumni Association (TNAA) 19th Biennial Convention was originally scheduled to be held August 6-9, 2020 at the Embassy Suites Hotel and Conference Center in Montgomery, Alabama. As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the TNAA Executive Board voted not to have an in person convention this year. But elections for TNAA national officers for the 2020-2022 term will still be conducted. The elections for TNAA national officers for the 2020-2022 term will be conducted via electronic ballot and by paper ballot for those alumni who will not be able to vote electronically.

The first HBCU cycling team is formed 120 years after a black cyclist became a star

Saint Augustine's University, in Raleigh, North Carolina, recently announced that they were forming the first cycling team at a historically black college or university (HCBU). The forming of this team comes 120 after Major Taylor became the first black athlete and champion within the sport. The new cycling team at Saint Augustine's University has already been approved and registered by USA Cycling. And for those who may want to cheer on the new team can begin doing so soon as the team will start competing as early as this fall.

HBCU Love: Tuskegee University Brought This Baltimore Power Couple Together

Marilyn Mosby, the State's Attorney in the city of Baltimore, Maryland and the youngest chief prosecutor of any major American city, says she met the love of her life at 18 years old while attending the historically black college and university (HBCU) Tuskegee University.

Before meeting her husband, Nick Mosby, on campus, Marilyn Mosby says she first fell in love with Tuskegee University on a Black college tour doing her junior year of high school that included students from across the state of Massachusetts. Mosby fell for the school farthest away from home. "I fell in love with the campus and the history. From Booker T. Washington and the veil of ignorance to George Washington Carver and the Tuskegee Airmen. Just the history and the beauty of that campus is something that definitely made me say 'I want to be here.'

And once she arrived on campus, Marilyn met and fell in love with a young man from Baltimore. "We met in the student union and I actually met him before but didn't pay any attention to him," Marilyn says of the day she fell for husband Nick. "It wasn't until me and a couple of girlfriends and a couple of his guy friends, linked up in the student union, bored on a Saturday and we just started talking about politics and music. I met this intriguing guy who I didn't pay attention to before, but for some reason, he was cute that day and it had more to do with his intellect than anything else."

Marilyn was attracted to Nick for not only his mind but also the things that seemed to matter to him. "The fact that he loved the city of Baltimore and he wanted to come back and do something for his community," is what Marilyn said sealed the deal for her.

It was at Tuskegee University that Marilyn not only found an intellectual match in Nick, but a community of people who were moved to improve the places they came from, and the places they were going. "There were so many people like that at Tuskegee who were making a difference and wanted to make a difference for our communities. And I think that that kind of sticks out for me the most," says the state prosecutor.

But more than the accolades that came along with her HBCU education, Mosby says she received awareness and validation for speaking up for marginalized communities. "When I look at what happened in the Tuskegee syphilis study, it's indicative of the federal government that failed to speak up and failed to do anything for marginalized people within this community."

Now in her role as Baltimore State's Attorney, Mosby believes she's doing just that. And Nick, the man she met as an 18-year-old girl is alongside her, working to change Baltimore as a Maryland state delegate and candidate for Baltimore City Council President. A meeting on that Saturday afternoon in the student center turned out to be a pivotal moment in both of their lives. Tuskegee, who Marilyn credits with laying the foundation for her consciousness and giving her the okay to be

unapologetically Black, is the place now credited with making the Baltimore power couple who they are.

The idea for hosting a virtual commencement ceremony for HBCU students was conceived by Dr. Michael Sorrell, president of Paul Quinn College and member of the Advancing Black Pathways (ABP) Advisory Council. Additional organizers include Howard University, The National Association for Equal Opportunity in Higher Education, Thurgood Marshall College Fund, United Negro College Fund and the National Basketball Association. Essence supported the event as a live-streaming partner.


