Tuskegee University News

Tuskegee Ranks 4th Among U.S. News and World Report's Top HBCUs

U.S. News and World Report has ranked Tuskegee University 4th among the nation's best Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) in its 2021 rankings. The move from 2020's 8th spot places the university solidly in the annual publication's list of top-10 HBCUs.

To identify the nation's best HBCUs, U.S. News measures the quality of undergraduate education programs and other relevant metrics. In addition to its #4 HBCU national ranking, Tuskegee appeared on the magazine's 2021 list of "Best Regional Universities, South," as the university advanced five places to the 20th spot. The university also tied 20th in ranking among "Undergraduate Teaching - Regional Universities (South)."

Improved Student Retention and Alumni Giving was cited as the reason for Tuskegee's ranking improvement from the 2020 report.

Philanthropist MacKenzie Scott Made a Record \$20 Million Donation to Tuskegee University

Tuskegee University received a \$20 million gift from philanthropist, activist and author MacKenzie Scott. Tuskegee University President, Dr. Lily D. McNair, said the unrestricted donation will help Tuskegee build on its reputation as one of the nation's leading institutions of higher education. The donation is the largest single gift in the university's history. "This gift comes at an opportune time for us," said McNair, who has led the institution since July 2018. "We are about to launch a five-year strategic planning effort and, with this investment from Ms. Scott, we will be able to unfold the next phase of our mission in ways we simply could not have considered before." Dr. McNair said she envisions the gift being used to support four broad areas at Tuskegee. Those areas include increasing student access, strengthening signature programs, advancing research and innovation, and preserving the university's legacy.

Tuskegee University receives \$100k gift to support aspiring African American architects

The Department of Architecture at Tuskegee University recently received a gift of \$100,000.00 from the Cooper Carry Charitable Foundation, Inc. The foundation is the charitable arm of the Cooper Carry architectural firm. The purpose of the financial gift is to increase access to the architecture profession for African American students.

\$80,000 of the gift will be used to establish new need-based scholarships for undergraduate students. \$20,000 of the gift is designated for a student technology scholarship that will allow students to receive technology assistance by providing laptops and architecture design software for students.

Samford's Cumberland School of Law Partners with Tuskegee University to Offer Students Accelerated Law Degree Plan

The Cumberland School of Law at Samford University and Tuskegee University has formed a new partnership to offer Tuskegee students an accelerated path towards achieving a law degree. This will allow Tuskegee students to participate in what is referred to as a 3+3 partnership program. Students will now be able to take three years of courses at Tuskegee and then three years at Cumberland. Upon completion, they would graduate with both a bachelors and law degree. Tuskegee joins Samford University, Birmingham-Southern College, the University of Montevallo and Troy University on the list of schools that have a 3+3 partnership with the Cumberland School of Law.

The two universities stated that the new partnership program will begin right away. Tuskegee juniors who have completed their core and major requirements can now use their first year of law school to fulfill any outstanding requirements for their bachelor's degree.

NIH awards four-year, \$1.48 Million grant to Tuskegee University College of Veterinary Medicine for Breast Cancer Research

The National Institutes of Health (NIH) has awarded a four year grant in the amount of \$1.48 Million to the Tuskegee University College of Veterinary Medicine for breast cancer research. Deepa Bedi, MD, Ph.D., is an associate professor in the college's Department of Biomedical Sciences and is serving as the principal investigator for the grant entitled, "Evaluation of HSPD1 (Heat Shock Protein, 60) as a theranostic target for breast cancer." Dr. Bedi during her research will evaluate the role of heat shock protein 60 in the progression of breast cancer.

"I aim to use this protein as a marker of TNBC progression as well as a target to deliver anti-cancer drugs to this highly aggressive and metastatic cancer. This grant will provide the necessary resources to fulfil this hypothesis and be able to contribute to the knowledge and cure of TNBC, particularly in African-American women," Dr. Bedi said.

"We are proud of the contributions that Dr. Bedi will make to biomedical research as she translates the discoveries and observations into therapies in her cancer laboratory in the college. The data and information gained from this newly funded research study will heighten awareness and enhance the Cancer Research program here at Tuskegee University," said Dr. Ruby L. Perry, dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine.

Dr. Bedi's work in cancer research is not new and was previously funded by NIH in a grant in 2016 in the amount of \$441,000 for three year duration. She also coordinates many efforts across campus with Dr. Clayton Yates, who is the director of the Center for Cancer Research at Tuskegee University.

According to the U.S. National Library of Medicine, breast cancer is one of the most frequently diagnosed cancers and the leading global cause of cancer death in women, accounting for 23% of cancer diagnoses (1.38 million women) and 14% of cancer deaths (458,000 women) each year. Triple-negative breast cancers (TNBC) occur in 10-15% of patients, yet this disease subtype accounts for almost half of all breast cancer deaths and represent as highly aggressive and metastatic phenotype, specifically among African-American women.

Nurse to Tuskegee Airmen dead at age 100

Irma "Pete" Cameron Dryden, a Black woman who served as a nurse to the Tuskegee Airmen during World War II, has passed at the age of 100. Ms. Dryden died on Sept. 17 at her home in Canton, Georgia, according to her daughter-in-law, Maggie Williams Dryden.

Ms. Dryden graduated from the Harlem Hospital School of Nursing in 1942. After graduation she travelled to Tuskegee, Alabama, where as a member of the U.S. Army Nurse Corps she cared for cadets training to be pilots. These pilots would later be known as the Tuskegee Airmen. The Tuskegee Airmen were the country's first Black military pilots and flew missions during World War II. They were trained by Tuskegee University.

Of the 50,000 nurses in the corps who served during World War II, fewer than 600 were Black, according to Pia Jordan, director of the Tuskegee Army Nurses Project. Ms. Dryden rose to the rank of second lieutenant. She married Tuskegee Airman Charles Dryden in a ceremony at Tuskegee Airfield in 1943.

After her service in the military, she helped start a New Jersey-based medical lab. She later moved in order to be closer to family.



HBCU NEWS

Historically Black Colleges and Universities Offer Success



Crystal deGregory, , founder of HBCUstory.org, a website with stories about historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs), first learned of HBCUs from her math teacher and others while growing up in the Bahamas. She would later go on to attend and graduate from Fisk University after being convinced by the university's director of admissions who convinced her that she would succeed at Fisk.

Fisk University is one of 101 colleges and universities that the U.S. Department of Education recognizes as HBCUs. These colleges and universities were established before 1964 with the goal of educating African Americans. The Higher Education Act of 1965 first mentioned the term "HBCU" and expanded federal funding for these institutions.

Some are four-year universities while others are two-year community colleges. They include everything from law and medical schools to schools offering degrees in liberal arts or theology. Students of all races can attend HBCUs, and not all HBCUs are predominantly Black. Nearly 300,000 students attend HBCUs.

While they enroll 10 percent of all African American college students, HBCUs produces almost 20 percent of African American graduates and 32 percent of African American STEM graduates (science, technology, engineering and math), according to the United Negro College Fund.

The first HBCUs established were Wilberforce University in Ohio, Cheyney University of Pennsylvania and Lincoln University in Pennsylvania. They were established in the North before the U.S. Civil War, when discrimination blocked Black students from predominately white colleges. These HBCUs trained Black teachers, ministers and tradespeople.

After the Civil War and Reconstruction, HBCUs were established in Southern states with the goal of educating the newly emancipated and freed slaves. Today, HBCUs retain a reputation for excellence. "Each institution is unique and is an important part of this country's educational fabric," U.S. Education Secretary Betsy DeVos said in a statement.


